The EARTH FIRST! Spring Equinox Celebration at Glen Canyon Dam is shaping up to be the conservation event of the year (at least for the month of March).

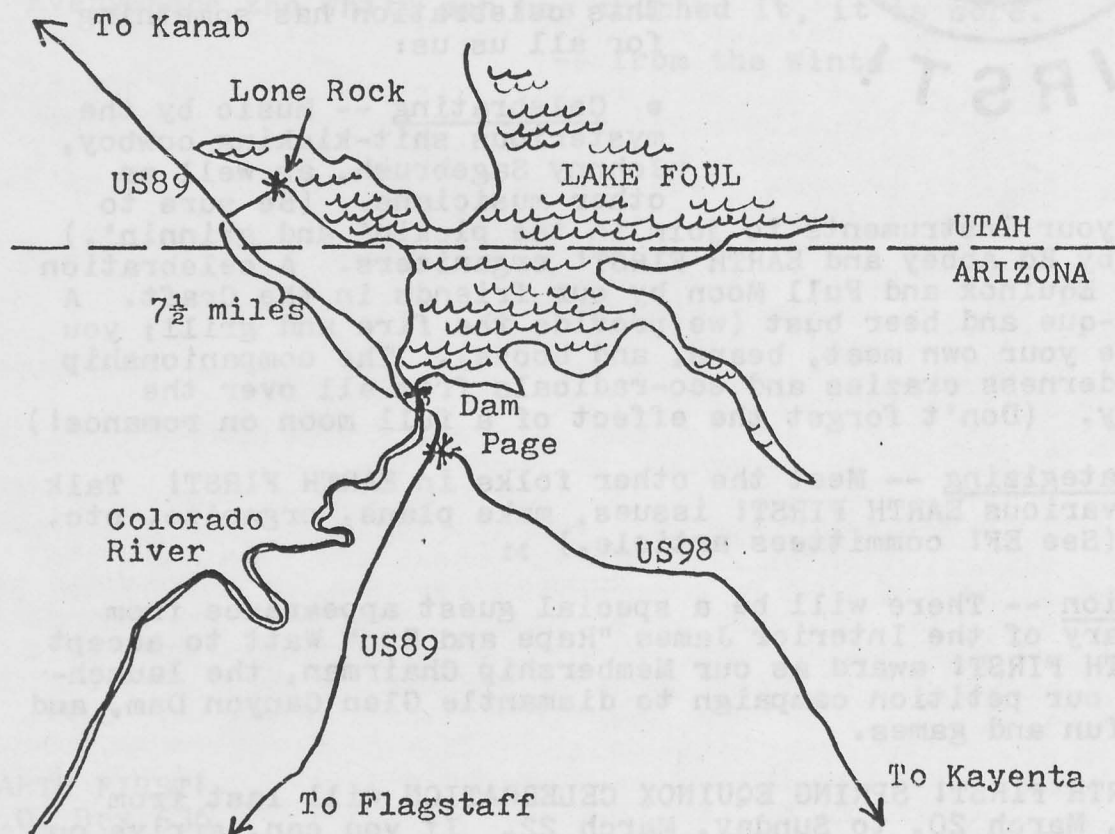

WATER CONTINUES TO RISE, NON-VIOLENT ACTION GOES ON
(December 19, 1980 - Friends of the River)

Two more people were arrested Thursday night (December 18) while waiting for the US Water and Power Resources Service to halt further inundation of the famous Stanislaus River Canyon. They were removed by officers of the Federal Protective Service of the General Services Administration at 6:00 PM closing time after the two stated that they would remain until the enlargement of the New Melones Reservoir stopped. They were then charged with trespassing and released. The two were Vince Haughey, 27, of Nevada City, and Alexander Gaguine, 30, of San Francisco.

Vince Haughey told WPRS Acting Regional Director Michael Catino: "It may be a small imposition for us to sit in your reception area, but it is a far greater imposition for WPRS to drown the Stanislaus Canyon." Catino had two cordial meetings with five people from the Water Reform Alliance, but declined to order a halt to the enlargement of the reservoir, saying the decision would have to come from higher levels in Washington. He forwarded the group's request to superiors.

Thursday night's arrests followed an identical protest of the filling on Wednesday during which Lisa Rowe, 26, of Coloma, and Patty McCleary, 25, of San Francisco, were arrested on the same charges and released (December 17). Ms. Rowe said, "America is my home, and I'm proud of it. But what is happening to the Stanislaus Canyon is happening all over the country, everywhere you turn."

After their release, Alexander Gaguine attempted to explain the actions this way:

"A whole community of people is being devastated. WPRS's actions are daily burying under water more and more of this beautiful green and gold canyon where thousands of people go. Unless citizens get President Carter to act immediately, Parrotts Ferry will probably never be seen again.

"We have more electricity and irrigation water than any society in history already, but what good are these if we take away people's sources of joy? The Stanislaus Canyon is a beautiful area with a river running through it which delights and inspires people. Anyone can come here.

"More than anyplace else, this is my home. People can't turn away when the places they love are being destroyed."

APPALACHIAN SURVIVAL/ALASKA SURVIVAL JOIN EARTH FIRST!

Recently affiliating with EARTH FIRST!, Appalachian Survival is a small band of mountain residents dedicated to the basics -- and survival is about as basic as you can get. The blinding truth of this revelation came to two of our founders as they meditated in the top of a couple of spruce trees near Alaska's Fortymile River. There are those who prefer the lotus position, or perhaps a hot tub, for serious meditation. However, the presence of a grizzly, swatting the trunk within inches of one's boot heel, forms a potent argument for the elevated meditation perch in wilderness situations.

Having survived the grizzly encounter, Appalachian Survival was formed to fight for the bare survival of the black bear and its wilderness range on Virginia's George Washington National Forest. Within months of the RARE II nonwilderness allocations, the GWNF approved a plan to construct ten miles of permanent road across the Crawford Mountain roadless area which is rated one of the three key ranges left for the state's dwindling bear population. In the course of an administrative appeal filed by conservationists, the GWNF was forced to revise the original positive B/C ratio to reveal that the road plan and intensive logging will produce only nineteen cents in timber receipts for every dollar in project costs. A FOI request produced documents showing the bear population could be reduced by fifty percent. Despite the GWNF's failure to comply with its own regulations, the Chief denied the appeal. Now AS is seeking other means for defending Crawford Mountain's bear range from the bulldozers.

Among actions in the planning stages are:

- (1) The First Annual Crawford Mountain Camp-in is planned to build support for the mountain and publicize this boondoggle. We will pitch our tents in the road route to block the bulldozers. Among problems yet to be solved is constructing a Cat-proof tent that can be erected on the ninety-degree slopes of the road route.
 - (2) AS is preparing to bid for the road construction contract. Upon receiving the \$461,298 from the US Treasury that is budgeted for the road construction, we will return nineteen cents on the dollar to the GWNF. The remaining eighty-one cents (amounting to \$373,651.00) will be used for improving forestry practices on low-lying private lands where more timber can be produced with fewer environmental impacts -- meanwhile preserving the Appalachian wilderness. (Any leftover funds will be devoted to bringing back the elk, bison, panthers, timber wolves, and giant sloths that once graced the Southern Appalachians and have been missing for far too long.)
 - (3) In addition to the EARTH FIRST! call for RARE II Alternative J (which could save the taxpayer millions of dollars on the GWNF alone), AS supports a wilderness/black bear preserve for all GWNF lands above the 2,500-foot contour. With no clearcutting allowed, the preservation of elevated meditation perches will be assured.

If members of AS are not behind bars by June, the Alaska arm of AS (Alaska Survival) will offer a seven hundred-mile raft trip down the upper Yukon. Views of the Yukon-Charley Rivers Preserve and the Yukon Flast NWR are promised, and, with a little luck, some more intensive meditation on the ways of grizzlies may be provided.

Alaska Survival is dedicated to preserving the Susitna's salmon runs for the sustenance of bears and humans. We oppose all threats to this resource -- especially the Susitna hydropower scheme.
